


Fig. 2—The global diffusion of waterfront revitalization, with some examples. (Cartography by Bob Smith, Department of Geography, University of Southampton)





































# Status quo

#### positive aspects

- regeneration is at the beginning
- fully accessible to general public, highly popular
- rich history, plans during communism
- seat of 3 national institutions
- competitive environment "Eurovea" vs. "River Park"
- accepted green space
- very good accessibility by public transportation
- Bratislava between Budapest and Vienna (twin cities)
- the Danube river
- positive examples: public spaces in front of "Eurovea", summer highlight "Magio beach"

# Status quo

#### negative aspects

- NO strategy, prioritization
- NO common understanding of waterfront
- many public stakeholders, week cooperation, few join actions
- NO platform for communication
- NO international cooperation
- week regulation on zonal level
- greenfields privately owned
- negative perceptions of PPP
- limited experience with public disscusions
- city hall rigid evironment
- NO attention to city port, riparian woodland
- city = hardware, not software

## Current challenges on the waterfront

- understanding of potential and risks
- better involvement of city hall/public sector
- from government to governance
- communication among stakeholders & with general public
- commercialization, gentrification, touristification
- "cleaning" of the waterfront
- professionalization of the city hall
